Summary of the audit report



We conducted leadership skill development training, facilitation skill development training, self assessment and personal development training and volunteer mobilization program.

Their initiatives significantly increased awareness of civic responsibility and social harmony, motivating others to contribute to the creation of a healthy, empowered, and conscious society.



Resilient environment

FAYA Nepal raises awareness and builds community capacity to ensure access to quality drinking water and promote hygiene and sanitation. This is vital as only about 28–30% of Nepal's population has access to safe drinking water, with many facing water contamination and poor sanitation. Improving hygiene and water management helps reduce waterborne diseases and health risks. Empowering communities to test and manage water quality and practice good hygiene is essential for better public health and sustainable water access in communities vulnerable areas.

Our Intervention

FAYA Nepal conducted an orientation for water user group (WUG) representatives on water quality management and chlorination techniques, along with practical training on the use of water quality testing kits. Additionally, provided training to Female Community Health Volunteers (FCHV), ward representatives and health facilities staffs on community WASH.

Our intervention have resulted, in the capacity building of four water user group on water quality and chlorination, including practical training on water quality testing kit, interpretation of water quality data.

We provided WASH training to 55 FCHV, 40 ward representatives, 40 water user group members and 16 health facility staffs that increased awareness and adaptation of WASH sensitive behaviours within the community.

We supported Godawari and Dhangadhi municipalities of essential WASH items to maintain a stock (at least 100 case) for enabling rapid response to unforeseen WASH emergencies.

DRM & Humanitarian Action

FAYA Nepal aims to enhance its humanitarian capacity by organizing capacity-strengthening workshops and developing a Capacity Strengthening Plan (CSP) to improve its ability to strategically assess humanitarian needs and engage effectively in participatory emergency responses. The organization seeks to build its institutional competencies and operational efficiency to deliver timely, inclusive, and effective humanitarian assistance to vulnerable communities during emergencies.

Our Intervention

FAYA Nepal carried out the review, update, and formulation of key organizational policies, procedures, and guidelines to strengthen institutional humanitarian capacity and ensure effective organizational management. Policy orientation sessions were conducted for staff, volunteers, board members, and general members to enhance their understanding and implementation of these frameworks. In addition, the organization organized day celebrations and capacity-building activities to foster teamwork, strengthen institutional identity, and promote continuous learning within the organization.

Improving Health Seeking Behaviour of Mothers & Children (IHSBMC)

In Nepal, maternal mortality remains a pressing concern, with a national rate of 151 deaths per 100,000 live births (NDHS 2022). The Sudurpashchim Province, where Chure Rural Municipality is located, reports a slightly lower but still alarming rate of 130 per 100,000 live births, underscoring the urgent need for targeted interventions. Therefore, FAYA Nepal aims to improve maternal and child health (MCH) in Chure Rural Municipality, Kailali District, by promoting improving health-seeking behaviors among community members. The organization promotes safe deliveries through public health facilities and strengthens the MCH service delivery systems of local health facilities. Furthermore, FAYA works to raise community awareness and knowledge on maternal and child health issues, contributing to improved health outcomes in this priority and underserved area.

ENHANCEMENT OF MCH SERVICE SYSTEM OF PUBLIC HEALTH INSTITUTIONS

The Garbha Basic Health Service Center (BHSC) was constructed in Ward No. 4 of Chure Rural Municipality, Garbha Darwar, Kailali. The new BHSC building fully complies with the Government of Nepal's standard requirements for health facilities. It includes an OPD room, storeroom, birthing room, maternity and child health (MCH) room, dressing room, dispensary, and registration corner. The center has been providing health services from the new building since April 23, 2025. Furthermore, the organization provided 25 types of medical and non-medical equipment's to enhance the quality of service delivery.

There was no waiting area, and rainwater often leaked inside, creating an uncomfortable environment, Now, with the new building, we have enough space and separate rooms for maternity, immunization, and counseling services. The environment is clean, bright, and safe, and both staff motivation and client satisfaction have greatly improved".

Rural Ultrasound Program

ROUSG onsite coaching and basic training for nursing staff are crucial in strengthening maternal and newborn health services in remote areas. Many health facilities in the Chure rural municipality faces challenges such as limited skilled human resources, inadequate clinical competencies and equipment. Through ROUSG basic training and onsite coaching, nursing staff received hands-on coaching training to enhance their capacity in safe delivery practices, newborn care, and emergency obstetric management. This intervention ensures that pregnant women and newborns receive timely, quality, and life-saving care at the local level ultimately contributing to reduced maternal and neonatal mortality rates in the municipality. After received ROUSG basic training and onsite coaching, the trained nursing staff provided USG service to pregnant women through regular campaigning in different location of municipality.

Provided two portable USG machines to health facilities in Chure Rural Municipality has greatly enhanced access, quality, and efficiency of early diagnostic services. This initiative has strengthened maternal health care, contributing directly to reducing maternal and neonatal mortality and improving overall primary health service delivery in remote cluster of the municipality.

Reproductive health camp

Our initiative to conduct a series of Reproductive Health Camps (four camps in different location) in the remote communities of Chure Rural Municipality, in collaboration with Nepalgunj Medical College, Kohalpur, significantly increased access to quality reproductive, maternal, and child health services for women and children. Through these camps, a total of 799 community members, including 616 females and 183 males, received specialized health services.

The camp managed pediatric cases and gynecological cases, addressing a broad range of health issues. Remarkably, 36 patients including those with hernias, cystocele, and uterine prolapse were referred for additional care. Early identification of reproductive health issues was made possible by screening programs like VIA and PAP smear tests. out of 44 PAP smear test, one case resulted positive, which has followed by the Medical collage as per agreement. In addition, the camp provided diagnosis and treatment for common ailments such as urinary tract infections, anemia, menstrual irregularities, pelvic inflammatory disease, and vaginal discharge syndrome



MCH AWARENESS AND KNOWLEDGE OF COMMUNITY PEOPLE

We achieved significant progress in enhancing maternal and child health (MCH) awareness across all six wards of Chure Rural Municipality. Through the mobilization of Female Community Health Volunteers (FCHVs) who received refresher training, the provision of technical support to 62 Health Mothers' Groups (HMGs) to facilitate HMG meetings, community-level health education and counseling were substantially strengthened. The initiative conducted 92 Pregnant Women Group orientations, engaging 1,103 participants including husbands and in-laws thereby fostering family involvement in safe motherhood practices. Regular EPI/ORC health education sessions (290 in total) reached 3,349 individuals, while 1,111 pregnant women home visits and 466 postnatal visits provided personalized care, resulting in 249 timely referrals for essential health services.

Additionally, the School Reproductive Health Program educated 1,637 adolescents across 11 secondary schools on puberty, menstrual hygiene, and safe reproductive practices, contributing to long-term behavioral change among youth. Complementary awareness initiatives, including World Breastfeeding Week, Family Planning Day, and FCHV Day, reached over 800 community members, further promoting positive MCH practices. Collectively, these interventions significantly improved community knowledge, encouraged timely service utilization, and strengthened the culture of health-seeking behavior in Chure Rural Municipality.

EPIDEMIC PREPAREDNESS

Epidemic preparedness and response training focused on Cholera was provided to 5 ward representatives and 5 officials from each selected ward (wards no. 7 and 8 in Godawari and 13 and 19 in Dhangadhi) to strengthen their ability to manage outbreaks effectively. This training was crucial for building local capacity to detect and respond promptly to epidemics.

Additionally, the supply of 100 rapid diagnostic test (RDT) Cholera kits (Vibrio Cholera Dipstick Crystal VC) to the Seti Provincial Laboratory significantly enhanced its capability for rapid diagnosis and efficient management of cholera outbreaks, ensuring timely and effective response to protect public health.

200 Students oriented

School awareness sessions resulted in 200 student of three secondary school, showing increased understanding of online child abuse, exploitation, and personal safety.

Our efforts strengthen the capacity of women Member of Parliament (MPs) and MPs from marginalized groups in the Sudurpashchim Provincial Assembly through need-based capacity building training, including leadership, public speaking, media handling and parliamentary procedures and mentoring support tailored to individual needs.

Our efforts significantly enhanced the knowledge and skills of MPAs in key areas such as legislative procedures, parliamentary regulations, budget formulation, GESI, media engagement, and public speaking. As a result, participants demonstrated improved confidence and effectiveness in fulfilling their political and parliamentary responsibilities. The initiative contributed to tangible improvements in their social, political, and personal spheres. Emphasizing the inclusion of women and MPAs from marginalized groups fostered greater participation and a more inclusive legislative environment in Sudurpashchim Province. Regular participants acknowledged the program's positive impact on their overall performance and expressed strong interest in continuing similar capacity-building initiatives, while non-participating MPAs also showed willingness to join future programs.
